Brazil Wins Historic First Team World Championship at the 2024 Surf City El Salvador ISA World Masters Surfing Championship

- Back-to-back defending champions Hawaii claim Team Silver Medal, Australia, Bronze, France, Copper
- Brazilian medalists in five of six divisions highlighted by Gold Medal for Diego Rosa
- Clean sweep for Hawaiian women as Becky Benson, Rochelle Ballard and Melanie Bartels are crowned World Champions
- Eric Graciet takes first-ever Masters Gold Medal for France, Scott Schindler carries legacy for Australia

Surf City El Salvador – October 24, 2024

A historic Finals Day in the 2024 Surf City El Salvador ISA World Masters Surfing Championship (WMSC) saw Brazil crowned as Masters Team World Champion for the very first time. Another day of incredible surf saw four-to-five foot walls lining the long, right point of El Sunzal. The conditions were ideal to crown World Champions from amongst the world's best surfers over the age of 40.

A clean sweep for Hawaii in all three women's divisions placed the back-to-back defending champions in second for the Silver Medal, with two-time champions Australia taking the Bronze Medal and France winning their first-ever Masters Team Medal, the Copper.

Brazil claimed medals in five of the six divisions, topped with a Gold Medal for Diego Rosa in men's Masters (over 40). Roberta Borges and Jojó de Olivença both won Silver Medals in women's Kahunas (over 60) and men's Grand Masters (over 50), respectively, with Andrea Lopes and Jacqueline Silva taking home Bronze in Grand Masters and

Masters, respectively.

"World Champion, man, I'm so happy, so stoked to be on the top of the world right now," Rosa said. "I'm so happy for my team. We've been working together for the whole week. Thanks a lot to our confederation back in Brazil too. They were working a lot to bring us here, and we're representing the best form here."

Rosa's powerful backhand topped that of two other strong goofy-footers, Gilbert Brown (CRC) and Hira Teriinatoofa (TAH), the two-time ISA

their own respect and all three were crowned World Champions today.

Having competed in her first ISA event over 52 years ago, in 1972, and participated as a member of the first-ever iteration of a professional surfing tour Opening with an 8.00 and then almost immediately | backing it up with an 8.90, the Hawaiian kept herself out of reach of her three fellow finalists. The powerful backhand of two-time Masters World Champion Heather Clark (RSA) came the closest to matching the precision of Ballard, but the South African had to settle for the Silver Medal, with Andrea Lopes (BRA)

taking the Bronze, Siri Cota (USA) the Copper.

Long a champion of women's surfing, having likely sacrificed a WSL World Title in 2004 to create a powerful advocacy group within the sport, it was fitting that the 53-year-old became the firstever women's Grand Masters World Champion.

"I'm so proud of all of it," Ballard said. "It feels good to get some deeper roots and legs moving in women's surfing. Everybody from our generation and the generation before us and the generation before that. That's all paving the road for what it is today. So you can't ever forget the past, and the roots, because it carries through in the now. And now, it's important that we all stand together as

A surfer who came up under the influence of Ballard's generation, Melanie Bartels (HAW) claimed her first World Title today. Bartels was on fire throughout the event, posting some of the highest scores and delivering passionate post-heat interviews. A two-time WSG Silver Medalist, the 42-year-old was determined to walk away with the Gold Medal in El Salvador.

Facing two WSL World Title runners-up, Serena Brooke (AUS) and Jacqueline Silva (BRA), both of whom she shared time with on the CT, along with ISA WSG veteran Lisbeth Vindas (CRC), Bartels

> dominated. Though it took a couple waves to find her rhythm in the Final, once she did, her power was unmatched, posting an 8.67 and 7.93, and throwing away a 7.57. Brooke found an early 7.33 and late 6.07 to collect the Silver Medal, with Silva taking Bronze and Vindas earning the Copper.

Eric Graciet takes firstever Masters Gold Medal for France, Scott Schindler carries legacy for Australia

Building his scores throughout the event, Eric Graciet (FRA) opened the men's Kahunas Final with his best yet, a 9.33. The 62-year-old maintained control for the entirety of the Final despite strong challenges from 2010 Kahunas World Champion Rodney Baldwin (AUS) and surfing legends Allen Sarlo (USA) and Shuji Kasuya (HAW), to win France their firstever Masters World Title. Baldwin's Silver Medal completes a full Kahunas collection that includes Gold, Bronze and Copper from previous events Sarlo's Bronze was also his fourth medal, while Kasuya won his first, the Copper.

Whatever success Scott Schindler (AUS) may have had in a professional surfing career was instead parlayed into a phenomenally successful business career.

The 53-year-old's delayed surfing ambitions came to fruition today however, as he became a World Champion for the first time after winning the men's Grand Masters Gold Medal.

"To pull up a world title at any age, at any level, is really a moment in time that I'm going to have with me for the rest of my life. It's such a pleasure to surf with such good surfers from all over the world. Even in the heats, the guys are so respectful. Everyone takes their turn, generally, and it's really a chance for surfing to win rather than hassling and competition."

Three-time medalist Jojó de Oli-

venca (BRA) opened with an 8.00 to control the first half of the men's Grand Masters Final. But Schindler had a good start of his own, posting a 7.33. An 8.17 later followed, providing the retired CEO turned firefighter with a 15.50 heat total to claim victory. De Olivença took the Silver Medal, Pablo Diaz (PUR), the Bronze, and Dani Garcia (ESP) won Spain their first-ever WMSC medal, the Copper.

ISA President Fernando Aguerre said:

"El Sunzal, what a place. And what a return of the ISA World Masters Championship. I'm sure you are going to be very, very happy to go home and tell all your friends about the beautiful waves, the beautiful people, the beautiful weather, and the amazing camaraderie of the ISA World Masters Championship.

"This year, I reached out to our friends in El Salvador and we agreed that it was a great time to start the Masters. That mix of competition. Because, of course, everybody wants to win the medal, but at the same time amazing camaraderie, reconnecting with friends, and some new friends. There are a lot of new masters. 10 years without championships has meant that many of the young surfers are now masters surfers. And this is the beauty of surfing. There are so many ways you can surf. But the only thing you should not do is give up on surfing. So I give my greatest congratulations to everybody that participated."



As with all of her heats, Benson opened early and strong, holding the lead for the duration of the Final. Late in the heat, Benson channeled her days charging Sunset Beach, to earn a 6.17 from a solid wave and put large requirements on the rest of the finalists. Roberta Borges (BRA) and Barbara Roettger (PUR), who first competed against each other in the 1986 ISA World Surfing Championships in Newquay, England, were locked in a tight battle for second. Borges got the nod to win the Silver Medal, with Roettger got the nod to win the Silver Medal, with Roettger taking Bronze and Sandra English (AUS) earning her fourth WMSC medal, the Copper.





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
U.S. National Park:

The words "For the Benefit and Enjoyment of the People" stretch across the northern entrance of our nation's first national park, Yellowstone.

According to the Department of Interior, the goal of the National Park Service is, and has always been, to keep our wild places protected and unimpaired for future generations. To that end, more than 400 areas and 84 million acres spanning all 50 states and several unincorporated territories of the United States, protect America's greatest natural treasures. With 61 of those wilderness areas toting National Park designation, it can be tricky trying to pick which park to visit.

So, to help you determine which parks should be higher on your bucket list, we ranked each park based on their overall accessibility, facilities and accommodations, trails and attractions, crowds, and, of course, overall 'wow' factor, which we measured by photo ops and stunning scenery.

Keep in mind, it's almost impossible to say that one is better than the next there's truly something special about each one of our national parks.=



Capitol Reef National Park, UTAH

With the sheer number of beautiful parks in southern Utah, it might feel like Capitol Reef is just another quintessential otherworldly landscape packed with wild geological formations. Although that's not entirely inaccurate, compared to the visitation numbers of other Utah parks, Capitol Reef can feel a lot like a hidden treasure.

Unusual, elaborate cliffs and canyons shape the landscape of Capitol Reef. The Waterpocket Fold, the second largest monocline in North America, extends for nearly 100 miles and appears as a bizarre "wrinkle" in the Earth's crust. Redrock canyons, ridges, buttes, and sandstone monoliths create a 387-mile outdoor retreat for hikers, campers, photographers, and rock climbers. And, as we know, a Utah national park can never be without incredible sandstone arches, and Capitol Reef is no exception; The Hickman Bridge stretches for 133-feet and offers canyon views in every direction.


Although there are 71 developed and 11 primitive campsites, there are no lodges or restaurants in the park. So, be sure to pack your s'mores before you hit the high desert. To add to the adventure, a trip to Capitol reef requires a 3-hour road trip from most major cities, including Grand Junction and Salt

Elizabeth Taylor Was the first Actress To Earn \$1 Million

Elizabeth Taylor was the first actress to earn more than \$1 million for a single movie, for 1963's Cleopatra. When the movie was first planned, her \$1 million salary was half of the original budget. As the film's budget boomed to \$31 million, Taylor's paycheck did as well — to \$7 million (around \$54 million in 2022).

From her youth, Taylor had been a bold negotiator and wasn't afraid to ask for what she was worth or to end a negotiation that wasn't going her way. Originally, she had little interest in starring in Cleopatra, which inspired her bold pay request of \$1 million and 10% of the box-office gross, thinking there was no chance 20th Century Fox would agree to her terms. To everyone's surprise, they did. As she later said, "If someone is dumb enough to offer me a million dollars to make a picture, I'm certainly not dumb enough to turn it down."



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STUDY FINDS WILDFIRES IN WESTERN US ARE GROWING FASTER, CAUSING MORE DAMAGE

Fox Weather / ANDREW WULFECK BOULDER, Colo. – A study led by the University of Colorado Boulder has revealed that fast-growing wildfires are responsible for nearly 90% of fire-related damage in the western part of the country.

The research, recently published in the journal Science, says that these rapidly growing fires are becoming increasingly dangerous both to lives and property and used Colorado's Marshall Fire as a tures exhibited growth rates of more than 21,000 acres in a single day.

"Fires have gotten faster in the western U.S. in just a couple of decades," Balch stated. "We need to focus on what we can do to prepare communities: hardening homes and making robust evacuation plans."

The results highlight a significant gap in wildfire risk models, which the experts contend do not take into account growth

The 2021 inferno burned just over 6,000 acres in a short time period but led to the destruction of more than 1,000 structures in Boulder County, Colorado.

According to researchers, in less than an hour after the initial fire was reported, the fire spread to a town 3 miles away and prompted the evacuation of thousands of Coloradans.

"We hear a lot about megafires because of their size, but if we want to protect our homes and communities, we really need to appreciate and prepare for how fast fires move," stated Jennifer Balch, an associate professor of geography and the lead author of the study. "Speed matters more for keeping people safe."

Researchers analyzed data from more than 60,000 fires in the U.s. from 2001 to 2020 and found a 250% percent increase in the average maximum growth rate of the fastest wildfires.

These "fast fires" accounted for 88% of the homes destroyed despite only representing a minimal percentage of the fires on record.

According to the study, fires that damaged or destroyed more than 100 strucrate or other measures of a wildfire's for-

"When it comes to safeguarding infrastructure and orchestrating efficient evacuations, the speed of a fire's growth is arguably more critical than its sheer size. the authors stated.

According to a congressional research report, an average of 61,410 wildfires burn approximately 7.2 million acres each

While most fires are caused by human activity, those ignited by lightning tend to be larger and cover more land.

As of 2024, there have been 43,602 reported wildfires that have burned 7.9 million acres, according to data from the National Interagency Coordination Center.

Notably, about 14% of the total acreage burned can be attributed to the Smokehouse Creek Fire, which scorched 1.1 million acres across Texas and Oklahoma.

Authorities determined that improperly functioning utility equipment was responsible for this significant blaze.

GOLD MEDAL-WINNING SPRINTER WHO TOOK UP **RUNNING AT 100 DIES AT 108**

mother-of-four who picked up the sport of running at age 100 and went Anon to set world records and win gold medals has died at the age of 108.

Julia Hawkins, nicknamed "Hurricane" for her running prowess, died on Oct. 22 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, after a "very short illness," her daughter, Margaret Matens, confirmed to ABC News.

Matens said that Hawkins' body would be donated, at her request, to the Pennington Biomedical Research Center at Louisiana State University, which is studying longevity.

"She had quite a run," Matens said of the extraordinary life of her mom, who is survived by her four children as well as three grandchildren and two great-

Hawkins told "Good Morning America" in 2019 that she turned to running at age 100 as an alternative to competitive cycling, a sport in which she also won multiple national titles after picking it up later in life.

Among other titles, Hawkins set a world record in the 100-meter dash at the 2017 National Senior Games.

Two years later, at the 2019 National Senior Games, Hawkins won gold medals in both the 50-meter dash and the 100-meter dash in the women's 100-

103-year-old nicknamed the 'Hurricane' wins yet another gold in 100-meter

At the time, Hawkins was believed to be the oldest woman to compete on an American track, according to the National Senior Games Association, the nonprofit organization that runs the National Senior Games.

"I just keep busy. I keep moving," Hawkins told "GMA" in 2019 about her secret to longevity. "I don't do any exercises particularly. I used to, but I don't think I need to anymore."

"I've always been careful how I eat, eat healthy and keep my weight at a certain point," she added.

Matens Hawkins also attributed her longevity to her many passions, which included fly fishing, gardening, reading, raising bonsai trees and watching Louisiana State University football.

Hawkins' late husband, who died in 2013 at the age of 95, was a professor at LSU, according to

Matens.
Hawkins ran her last race three years ago at the age of 105 in her home state of Louisiana.

According to 14 Matens, she set a new record during the race 14 as the only woman in 9 the 105-109 age group to run the 100-meter dash.

to naturally filter and replenish the drinking water supply for 2.5 million people in north and central Orange County. Cities like Fountain Valley and Huntington Beach tremendously benefit from this local resource, which is more reliable and less expensive than imported water.

Our primary operational goals during storm season are to capture as much as we can, not lose it to the ocean, and store it for future use. Once stormwater is captured, it is directed into recharge basins, where it can slowly percolate into the groundwater aquifers. This process ensures that water is available not only for immediate needs but also for future demand, contributing to long-

term water reliability for the region. Regular basin

The Orange County Water District captures stormwater to put back into its groundwater basin, which increases the drinking water supply for our region.

> cleaning and ongoing maintenance ensure that these facilities operate at peak efficiency, maximizing the amount of stormwater that can be recharged.

The District's preparation and recharge efforts contributed to a record-breaking year in fiscal year 2023-24, with over 90 billion gallons of water replenished into the groundwater basin—more than ever before since record keeping began in the

1940s. This success is a result of OCWD's comprehensive groundwater management approach, which leverages diverse water sources, including the Santa Ana River, stormwater capture, and recycled water from the Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS), the world's largest water

reuse facility.

Decades of smart water management practices and collaboration with OCWD's 19 cities and retail water districts have helped maintain a sustainable water supply for the region. As a result, the groundwater basin is now at its fullest since the 1980s.

But our work doesn't stop here. We are always looking for ways to maximize our water supplies – whether it is storing more water behind Prado Dam that can eventually be released to us and recharged into the basin or finding innovative solutions to enhance our operations – we are committed to this and more to ensure the resiliency

What's the Difference Between a Rocks Glass and an Old Fashioned Glass?

Here's everything to know when comparing the two.

On paper, the rocks and the Old Fashioned glass serve similar purposes. Both are short glasses meant for holding neat pours, a spirit with an ice cube or two, or cocktails such as a Sazerac and, yes, an Old Fashioned.

Both glasses perform this job well, though there are a few key differences between the two. The biggest difference is the size: The Old Fashioned glass is smaller, sized to hold a single Old Fashioned with a large cube of ice or smaller cubes. The rocks glass (or double Old Fashioned glass) offers a larger capacity—ideal for a bigger mixed drinks or those with a generous amount of ice.

What else defines these two glasses? To help you find which glassware is right for your pour, we explored the slight differences and compared the top brands of both styles. today, however. In the 17th and 18th centuries, whiskey glasses were shallow, rounded silver or wooden glasses called quaichs.

The rounded bottom stuck around through the 18th century, and by then, glasses were known as tumblers. Legend has it that the glasses earned this name because they would tumble over and break if you set them down.

OLD FASHIONED GLASS FAST FACTS

This glass has a thick base to hold up to muddling

Generally smaller, holding 6–8 ounces

Ideal for neat pours, a spirit over ice, or drinks with few ingredients

Designed for the drink to be built in the glass

In 1862, Jerry Thomas wrote in his bartender's guide that the Whiskey Cocktail (the earlier iteration of the Old Fashioned) was shaken over fine ice and strained

into a "fancy" red wine glass.

Today's Old Fashioned glass looks a little different. It holds between six to eight ounces, or a two-ounce pour of whiskey plus ice. An Old Fashioned glass features a low profile, a wide diameter, a thick base, and a flat bottom, perfect for muddling and large enough to hold a handful of small cubes or one nice, plump rock.

Old Fashioned glasses are designed for the drink to be built directly in them. In the case of an Old Fashioned, that means you'll add sugar, bitters, a splash of water, and citrus peel to the glass, muddle until the sugar is dissolved, add ice and whiskey, and stir until dilution is achieved. Some alternative stirred and spirit-forward cocktails to make in this style of glass are a Sazerac, a Vieux Carré, and a Negroni.

The Rocks Glass

Although Old Fashioned, rocks, and lowball glasses are often advertised as the same thing, there are slight nuances that separate Old Fashioned glasses from rocks glasses. The primary difference is the size: As the name implies, Old Fashioned glasses are sized to hold exactly one Old Fashioned.

Rocks glasses vary more in size and are traditionally seven ounces or larger. Old Fashioned glasses were generally more popular before Kold-Draft and large-format ice trended, but now that large, slick, hand-cut ice has become a fixture of bars, larger rocks glasses have stepped into play.

ROCKS GLASS FAST FACTS:

Rocks glasses have larger capacities, usually 7 ounces or larger Also known as double Old Fashioned glasses

Larger capacity makes the glass more versatile, as it can hold drinks with multiple ingredients

The size makes rocks glasses more versatile. With nearly double the capacity of an Old Fashioned glass, this glass is ideal for drinks that have a higher proportion of non-alcoholic mixers. You can make an Old Fashioned or opt for any number of other cocktails that have multiple ingredients such as a Penicillin or the Pe-

tronio from Alquímico, our Global Spotlight Winner 2023.

If you're on the fence about which glass to buy, look for a rocks glass. There's no need to own both glasses, and the rocks glass pulls double duty for Old Fashioneds and a wide range of other drinks. Bonus: the Yarai Rocks Glass from Cocktail Kingdom doubles as an impromptu mixing glass.

Toyota Is Betting On This Air Taxi Startup

Air taxis are still expected to be a big industry, but they now face competition from robotaxis.

Toyota reveals it will invest an additional \$500 million in Joby Aviation, which is developing an electric air taxi for urban flight routes.

The startup has recently completed its third production aircraft, which features an all-electric range of about 100 miles.

The air taxi industry is expected by some industry analysts to surge in popularity by the end of the decade, but significant regulatory and pricing barriers remain.

The gleaming future in which we all zoom around in electric air taxis may not quite be here—instead it's just Zoom calls—but this isn't stopping automakers from supporting air taxi startups in a major way.

Toyota is one such backer of an electric vertical take-off and landing

(eVTOL) startup, Joby Aviation, and it has just revealed a planned \$500 million investment aimed at developing electric air taxis to be used as part of commercial passenger service.

This financial commitment will bring Toyota's total investment in Joby to \$894 million, and it's aimed at the certification and commercial production of the startup's planned air taxi. In fact, the two companies have been working together for quite some time. "Today's investment builds on nearly seven years of collaboration between our companies," said JoeBen Bevirt, founder and CEO of Joby Aviation.

Joby has recently completed its third eVTOL craft at its pilot production line in California and is gearing up to begin building yet another assembly facility. The startup is also making progress on aircraft type certification, having reached the fourth of five certification stages.

But another hinted longer-term goal of this partnership is to create a manufacturing alliance for the commercialization of Joby's air taxis.

We were told 10 years ago that this gleaming eVTOL future would get here by the mid-2020s.

Toyota engineers have already been working alongside Joby employees on tooling and manufacturing design, as the company has approached the pilot production phase of the process, with the automaker also scheduled to provide powertrain components for the craft.

Last November Joby's eVTOL craft saw its first flight in an urban area, with the startup bringing the six-rotor craft to New York City, one of the metro areas long hoped to benefit from such aircraft.

Joby's debut four-passenger model promises a range of 100 miles, revealing plans to partner with Delta Airlines in the NYC area to effectively take over some routes currently served by noisy and expensive helicopters.

We are now a few years out from that impossibly slick UberAIR video, which painted a picture of seamless travel from small airports positioned on skyscraper rooftops, presumably without TSA lines, satellite parking lots located a zip code away, or requirements to arrive half an hour before departure.

That orange-tinged future has remained firmly in the subfolders of CGI rendering software, even though quite a few prototypes have since taken to the skies, with larger business model concerns proving to be a bigger hurdle than



the tech alone.

Still, eVTOL craft are expected to achieve some measure of use in the coming years, with a recent study by Juniper Research proposing that the Advanced Air Mobility (AAM) revenues will reach \$6 billion by 2030, representing a major hike from a predicted \$31 million in 2025. The main competitor facing eVTOL craft is perhaps an unexpected one, and it's not older, noisier helicopters.

Rather, it is slower robotaxis that can actually pick up passengers curbside when summoned via an app, and at the moment they seem to have a distinct advantage in sheer number and price per trip, even if they (usually) do not go airborne.

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
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The American Companies That Aren't Actually American Anymore

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FAMOUS MURDERS THAT REMAIN UNSOLVED

That's not to say that all unsolved murders are created equal. For some, almost everything about the case is unknown: the culprit, the victim's identity, the method, the motive. On occasion, the best the police can tell the public is that someone was definitely killed, but anything after that is nebulous. With other cases, everyone knows who did it, but they managed to get acquitted or gave the police an alibi. In still others, the only reason that witnesses aren't pointing fingers at the culprit is that these fingers will be immediately cut off — along

However, for what little good it did for the victims, sometimes being unable to solve a murder drives those left behind to improve the world so that no one else has to suffer the same fate.

Bernardine Dohrn



If you asked the FBI during the 1970s, one of the most dangerous women in the nation was a law school graduate named Bernardine Dohrn. She had already earned a graduate degree from the University of Chicago in 1964, according to Encyclopedia.com. After she earned her law degree in 1967, she moved to New York City and helped organize a student revolt at Columbia University in 1968. She returned to Chicago later that year, growing more involved with radical leftist causes. Dohrn concluded that violence had to be part of the movement and formed an activist group known as the Weather Underground.

They dove into plans for a "Days of Rage" protest that would see thousands of protestors going head to head with Chicago law enforcement. The action fizzled when only a few showed up, though Dohrn and others were arrested after breaking through a police blockade.

After this, Dohrn doubled down, arguing that the Weather Underground needed to start bombing government buildings to prove its anti-capitalist point. Things unraveled in early 1970, when three Weather Underground members were killed by bombs meant for Fort Dix. Dohrn went into hiding and the FBI put her on its Most Wanted List. Ten years later, married and with three children, she resurfaced. For all of her violent rhetoric and the fear she inspired, Dohrn was fined \$1,500 and sentenced to three years of probation. Dohrn went on to become a law professor at Northwestern University (via Northwestern Now).

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

The Tostada is the most dated item. It was one of the six items released at Taco Bell's first walkup location in California, per a press release, and tops a tostada shell with refried beans, red sauce, lettuce and shredded cheese. This item will go for \$2.19Tostada; Green Sauce Burrito

The 1970s is represented with the Green Sauce Burrito, which combines refried beans, onions, shredded cheese and a tomatillo-jalapeño green sauce in a soft tortilla for \$2.49. Customers have tried using ordering tricks to recreate this burrito over the years, making this one of Taco Bell's "most-hacked" items, according to the company.

MTV might not play music videos like they did in the 1980s but Taco Bell is bringing back a different relic of the time. The highly-requested Meximelt (\$3) is a tortilla filled with beef, pico de gallo and a threecheese blend (mozzarella, cheddar and monterey jack

One bite of the \$3 Gordita Supreme should bring back memories of Beanie Babies, mood rings and Tamagotchis. The 1990s-inspired option is a flatbread stuffed with beef, sour cream, lettuce, tomatoes and the same three-cheese blend as the Meximelt.

The Gordita Supreme will also be available in a \$7 Luxe Cravings Box, alongside a Beefy 5-Layer Burrito, Double Stacked Taco, chips and nacho cheese and a fountain drink.

The 2000s bring a sweet item: the Caramel Apple Empanada. The Y2K throw back packs a crispy dough with apple pieces and caramel for \$3. Unlike the other Decades Menu items, this limited-time dessert won't be available until Nov. 21.

Fans can score the Caramel Apple Empanada for even less than its \$3 price tag from Nov. 21 to Dec. 18. During those weeks, customers who order all four other items — Tostada, Green Sauce Burrito, Meximelt and Gordita Supreme — can grab the 2000s item for \$1 on the Taco Bell app.

Taco Bell is also selling retro-inspired goodies. Limaule to purchase on the app on Oct. 29. Fans can also stop by stores to snag plastic versions of the cups with a medium drink purchase.

The retail sector can often be fickle, even when the company is loved and established. Some of the titans in the industry have faced tough times in recent years, with even the seemingly infallible ones shuttering locations for good.

From Aldi to Costco, Walmart, and even designer stores, it looks like no one is safe. Business status can change on a dime, but let's see which household names are closing the doors for good in 2023. Will your local store be next – or has it managed to escape the retail apocalypse?

Fry's Electronics Year Established: 1985 **Store Closures: 30**

No matter what you needed, whether it was a new waffle maker for Saturday morning breakfasts with the family, tools for the garden, or parts to upgrade your PC, Fry's Electronics had it all. It was a one-stop shop that first opened in Sunnyvale, California, but quickly made its mark in eight other states.

At the end of February 2021, citing "challenges posed" by the events of 2020 as one of the major factors involved, Fry's Electronics announced that it would be ceasing operations immediately — and the closures were permanent. ©Brett Hondow/Shutterstock.com

J.C. Penney Year Established: 1902 **Store Closures: 156**

Like many other companies that followed a similar business plan, J.C. Penney's sales were hurt tremendously over the past decade by the emergence of online shopping. The 2020 economic crisis and a change in the industry's climate led to J.C. Penney filing for bankruptcy.

In the fall of 2020, :Simon Property Group and Brookfield Management agreed to buy J.C. Penney for debt and cash that will total close to \$800 million. The sale of the company led to only 156 locations closing (90 in the United States). It also meant that J.C. Penney — as a store name — has lived to see another day.

Michaels

Year Established: 1973 **Store Closures: 5**

If you plan to decorate your home with personalized crafts or hand-paint wooden frames for the photos of your most treasured memories, Michaels will probably have what you need. Are you expecting a new child or grandchild? Michaels also has everything you'll need to knit "blankies," frilly hats, and scratch-preventing mittens for the soon-to-be arriving little one.

By 2021, Michaels operated close to 1,000 locations across 49 states (everywhere other than Hawaii) and had reported sales of \$5.3+ billion for 2020. Still, late that year, the top brass at Michaels sold the business to Apollo Global Management in a deal worth \$3.3 billion and \$22/share for each of Michaels' outstanding shares.

Neiman Marcus Year Established: 1907 **Store Closures: 4 Branches***

The news about Neiman Marcus broke in mid-April of 2020, so the exact amount of store closures for the 113year-old retailer is, for now, unknown. Inside sources at Neiman Marcus confirmed to Reuters that the Dallasbased business is in the process of declaring bankruptcy and negotiating with creditors for an emergency loan.

Thankfully, the process was resolved in late 2020 and Neiman Marcus was purchased by several investment firms, which plan on bringing the company back to its former glory. As of mid-2021, the much-loved brand is trying to get back on its feet and expand its digital presence while holding on to stores. The New York Times described Neiman Marcus as a former "symbol of luxury" - but whether more stores will close in 2022 remains to be seen.

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'I WOULD FIRE HIM WITHIN TWO SECONDS,' TRUMP SAYS ABOUT SPECIAL COUNSEL JACK SMITH

WASHINGTON - Former President Donald Trump made it official Thursday: If he is reelected, he would dismiss Special Counsel Jack Smith, who is prosecuting cases against him.

"I would fire him within two seconds," Trump told radio show host Hugh Hewitt.

Smith is the top prosecutor in two cases against Trump, one involving efforts to overturn

the 2020 election and the other dealing with taking classified documents when he left office.

In the Thursday interview, Hewitt asked Trump if he would pardon himself or fire Smith; Trump responded that he would do the latter.

Trump's comments drew swift condemnation from some legal experts for violating the norm that presidents allow the Justice Department to operate independently.

"Mr. Trump has made it clear time and again he views himself as above the law,"

Bradley P. Moss, an attorney who specializes in national security matters told USA TODAY. "If he wins in November, armed with Supreme Court precedent on immunity, he will govern like he is above the law as well."

Trump has previously attacked Smith and suggested he would fire him.

"I wouldn't keep him," Trump said to Breitbart News in July 2023. "Jack Smith? Why would I keep him? He is deranged."

Trump also said in a post on Truth Social that Smith should be in jail. "They ought to throw Deranged Jack Smith and his Thug Prosecutors in jail," Trump wrote.

During his first administration, Trump tried to fire Special Counsel Robert Mueller, who was investigating Russia's efforts to assist

Trump's 2016 campaign, and to impede Mueller's investigation, according to Mueller's report.

report.

Trump has said he would use the Justice Department to prosecute opponents for unspecified

Trump's comments on Smith come on the heels of new evidence against him being released in the election interference case last week



and his own former White House Chief of Staff John Kelly telling the New York Times this week that Trump "falls into the general definition of fascist."

Hewitt noted that a dismissal of Smith could invite an impeachment inquiry, just as happened to President Richard Nixon after he fired Watergate special prosecutor Archibald Cox in October of 1973.

Trump responded that he does not think Congress would impeach him for firing Smith.

Las Vegas Mom Was Found Dead by Hikers 30 Years Ago. Now Police Have ID'd Her Killer

Melonie White's death 30 years ago baffled investigators until 2021 when they began working with a local volunteer group that helps crack cold cases

Thirty years after a mother was found strangled to death alongside a Las Vegas highway, police have finally identified the man they believe killed her.

The Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department announced this week that genetic genealogy led them to identify Arthur Lavery, the man they believe killed 27-year-old Melonie White in late August 1994.

Lavery had moved from Las Vegas to California in the mid-2000s. He died from COVID there on Feb. 20, 2021, according to Las Vegas police.

White's two younger brothers both spoke alongside police at a press conference this week and applauded investigators for "never giving up" on finding their sister's killer.

"We will always miss Melonie and we believe the solving of her murder will bring closure to all of us," her younger brother Jason White told reporters.

"She had a super kind heart," her youngest brother Walter White added. "She was just a really nice person. It's just tragic."

The brothers said their older sister's son is now 33 years old. "He's happy and he's healthy," they said.

Melonie was "struggling" with her career around the time of her disappearance and was routinely traveling back-and-forth between the White family's home in Phoenix and Las Vegas, where she would visit her boyfriend, her brother Walter said this week.

"She was kind of at some crossroads in her

life at the time," Walter, who was seven years younger than Melonie, recalled. "She had some trouble with jobs and trying to figure out what she was going to do for her career. She was kind of struggling."

Melonie's family reported her missing after they couldn't contact her for some time, Las Vegas police said at this week's news conference announcing the identity of her killer.

Her body was later found by two hikers on Aug. 27 near the entrance of the Lake Mead Recreation Area, police said. "It was obvious she had been dragged there," Las Vegas Police Homicide Lieutenant Jason Johansson said.

Johansson said investigators at the time "received many leads, and every one of them

was followed up on, but ultimately their exhausted effort did not identify the suspect."

DNA of the suspected killer was recovered at the scene, but it didn't return any matches in the national CODIS database used to find suspects and missing persons.

However, in 2021, police sent the DNA profile to the Vegas Justice League, a local volunteer organization who assists the department in solving cold cases. The volunteer group matched the DNA profile to Lavery using forensic genealogy.

White's brothers said finally having an answer may allow their family some peace of mind after 30 years of not knowing who killed their sister.

"The effect of her death really shattered my mother," Walter said. "That was probably the biggest ongoing thing for our family. My mom was absolutely destroyed and it took a long time for that to get back to a normal situation. It's nice to have closure now."

As the climate crisis gets more pressing, video games are emerging as powerful tools to educate young people about environmental issues. Games offer an interactive, engaging platform

ful, letting young players make decisions that mirror real-world environmental consequences of human actions.

One standout game in this genre is "Fate of the World" (available on PC and Mac), which places players in charge of managing the Earth's resources and climate while addressing the needs of a growing global population. It highlights the difficulty of balancing development with conservation and emphasizes how every decision—whether

political, social or environmental—has consequences. It fosters critical thinking by allowing players to test strategies, from implementing renewable energy to enforcing strict regulations.

"Ice Flows," available on iOS, Android and the web, focuses on the effects of climate change in Antarctica. Players simulate the behavior of Antarctic ice sheets and observe how climate change affects global Fate of the

World sea levels. This game introduces young players to polar environments, offering a tangible way to understand the consequences of global warming in one of the world's most vulnerable regions.

"Save the Rhino" tackles wildlife conservation. Available on iOS and Android, in this game players control animals like rhinos and elephants, bringing attention to the ongoing threat of poaching. This direct engagement with the animals

themselves fosters empathy and a deeper understanding of the poaching crisis, showing players how conservation efforts can positively affect wildlife.

"Plasticity" (for PC) tackles a world overwhelmed by plastic waste. It encourages players to reflect on the long-term impact of plastic consumption and pollution by navigating a future dystopia caused by neglect, driving home the importance of individual and collective responsibility in addressing the crises.

By using interactive gameplay, simulations and storytelling, these games encourage critical thinking and problem-solving, making abstract concepts like climate change and resource management more tangible. The use of technology, such as AI and simulations, brings the consequences of human behavior to life in an immersive and engaging way. As this trend continues, the development of augmented reality (AR) and virtual reality (VR) technologies promises even more immersive environmental education experiences.

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

In a Sentence:





fund research on water management, and promote farm-to-table initiatives that connect consumers with the state's agricultural heritage.

Some of the other standout findings from across the country include:

'JEOPARDY', 'WHEEL OF FORTUNE' UNDER FIRE: GAME SHOWS HIT WITH RACE DISCRIMINATION CLAIMS

Executives at "Jeopardy!" and "Wheel of Fortune" discriminated against people of color then fired them for raising concerns about a toxic work environment where staffers made disparaging remarks about Black contestants, two former employees allege in civil rights complaints obtained by USA TODAY.



The two former Sony Pictures Entertainment workers said they were consistently given fewer opportunities than their white colleagues and were routinely subjected to racially insensitive behavior, including crew members mocking a Black contestant's natural hairstyle.

Shelley Ballance Ellis, 60, said she was the highest-ranking Black production executive on the popular game shows. During her 26-year tenure, she said she was loaded down with extra responsibilities but passed over for promotions.

Monique Diaz, 48, who is Latina and worked on the shows for 23 years, said she was paid substantially less than a newly hired white colleague.

In April, Ballance Ellis and Diaz were laid off in what the company said was a corporate reorganization.

"The truth is that I and others were targeted by Sony because we opposed discrimination," Ballance Ellis alleged in her complaint.

In a statement to USA TODAY, Sony said the new leadership team at "Jeopardy" and "Wheel of Fortune" are "dedicated to fostering a culture of inclusivity and respect."

"Sony Pictures Entertainment takes all allegations of discrimination very seriously. Earlier this year there was a broad reorganization of our game show group that resulted in the elimination of several roles to address redundancies and evolving business needs of a 40-plus-year-old operation. Those eliminations were business efficiency decisions and not retaliatory," the statement said.

Attorneys Peter Romer-Friedman and Hillary Benham-Baker, who represent Ballance Ellis and Diaz, said Sony violated California civil rights laws.

Complaints filed with the California Civil Rights Department are investigated by the agency, which can sue the company, dismiss the charges or grant workers the right to pursue their own lawsuit.

"What happened to Shelley and her colleagues behind the closed doors of production should not happen and it was unlawful under our civil rights laws," Benham-Baker told USA TODAY.

The allegations against "Jeopardy" and "Wheel of Fortune" come amid rising tensions over persistent opportunity gaps for talent from diverse backgrounds in the entertainment industry.

When George Floyd was murdered by a white police officer in May 2020, major studios and networks joined in calls for equality, pledging solidarity and millions of dollars. But

those commitments have since faded.

In an exclusive interview with USA TODAY, Ballance Ellis said marginalized people are often overlooked and undervalued in mainstream Hollywood, where mostly white power brokers decide who gets the job or promotion or what stories are told on screen.

Ballance Ellis' family has deep roots in the entertainment business – her grandfather was an actor and her father a studio executive and her grandparents owned the historic Ebony Showcase Theater in Los Angeles – so she said she felt a responsibility to "use her voice for good" in an industry where few people of color without connections dare speak out.

"I hope that this will be an opportunity for any entertainment executive to look at themselves and really, take an open, honest look," she told USA TODAY.

Complaint alleges racially insensitive jokes, halted career ambitions

"Jeopardy" and "Wheel of Fortune" are mainstays of American television and major financial contributors to the Sony entertainment ecosystem.

Ballance Ellis led the clearance and licensing department, which obtains legal rights to video clips, artwork, music and other intellectual property featured on the shows, where she said she had a "front-row seat" to racial bias and insensitivity.

In her complaint, Ballance Ellis says the company tolerated racially insensitive jokes about Black contestants.

During a "Wheel of Fortune" production meeting in 2020, a Black employee said he overheard colleagues saying a Black woman's locs hairstyle reminded them of the movie "The Elephant Man," about a man grotesquely disfigured by a congenital disorder who makes his living as a sideshow attraction in Victorian England.

When the show's director responded that he and the crew members were just joking, Ballance Ellis said in her complaint that she commented: "Which part is funny?"

Ballance Ellis said she also raised concerns about biased "Jeopardy!" clues and advocated for "more inclusive, nuanced clues about people from diverse backgrounds."

For example, in 1999 in the "Black History" category, the clue was: "The black population of these U.S. areas, the destination of 'white flight,' doubled in the '70s and '80s." The answer was "the suburbs."

"I mean to think that people are moving out of a neighborhood because Black people move in. That is not Black history of anything," she said. "After that happened, people I knew were offended and in my opinion, rightfully so. I was embarrassed to work somewhere where that happened."

Walking This Many Minutes Per Day Could Add Years To Your Life, Recent Research Finds

Walking This Long Could Add Years To Your Lifeminiseries

Walking has seen a surge in popularity over the past few years, thanks to a slew of research that's found that it's great for your overall health and longevity. Now, another study has found that you don't need to log several miles to reap the benefits of walking. Instead, just a few minutes a day could provide a serious boost for your overall health.

So, what's the deal with this study and why is walking so good for you? Here's what we know.

Meet the expert: Albert Matheny, RD, CSCS, co-founder of SoHo Strength Lab.

What did the study find?

The meta-analysis, which was published in the British Journal of Sports Medicine, analyzed data from 196 peer-reviewed articles that involved more than 30 million people. The researchers specifically looked at the link between the participants' physical activity and health

After crunching the data, the researchers discovered that people who logged 75 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise (which includes brisk walking) per week had a 23 percent lower risk of early death.

When the study authors broke that down even more, they found that 75 minutes a week of moderate-intensity exercise lowered the risk of cardiovascular disease by 17 percent and cancer by seven percent

Why is walking so good for you?

There are a few reasons why walking is beneficial. For one, it's approachable.

"There's no skill hurdle and people aren't usually intimidated by it," says Albert Matheny, R.D., C.S.C.S., co-founder of SoHo Strength Lab. You also don't need extra equipment, meaning you can usually just walk out the door and go.

"Walking is great because it's a cardiovascular exercise, but it's also weight-bearing," Matheny says. "That's ultimately better for bone density and overall mobility."

In addition to all of that, research has linked a walking habit with better moods, improvements in heart health, and a lowered risk of developing diabetes.

How much walking do you need to do per day to reap the benefits?


It really depends on your goals. This particularly study found that walking at a solid pace for just 11 minutes a day (a.k.a. 75 minutes spread out over the course of seven days) can give you all of those health perks mentioned above.

But that doesn't mean you need to stop walking once you hit 11 minutes. "There's no magic number," Matheny says. "It's not like if you walk less than 5,000 steps, you get no benefit."

If you're looking to take up a walking habit for fitness, he suggests aiming for 5,000+ steps a day. Ultimately, though, Matheny recommends just doing what you can.

How can I add more walking to my day?

There are so many ways to take up a walking habit, including making it a regular workout or finding ways to sneak it in, like walking to a friend's house versus driving there. (You may need to upgrade your footwear to get a good walking shoe if you plan to ramp things up, though.)



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
